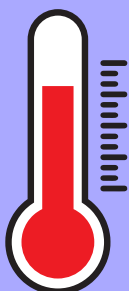

Again, their hard work seems to have paid off with students achieving some outstanding grades.

The UCAS deadline for September 2026 university applicants closed in January, and I am thrilled to report that we sent off just shy of 500 applications—representing more than 90% of our Year 13 cohort.

In preparation for the upcoming summer exam season, all A-level students have recently completed KAP exams. This provides essential practice, and it is important that students respond positively to the feedback received from these assessments. The summer exams will come around very quickly, so it is important that students maintain their momentum and focus.

The College remains as vibrant as ever. We recently hosted a successful Open event, welcoming over 800 visitors who learned what it is like to be a student of the college, as well as providing an opportunity to find out more about particular subjects. It was a fantastic event that showcased the strength of the St Francis Xavier family.

My thanks to Deacon Tony and Jamie Gittens, who accompanied a group of 13 students on a 3-night retreat to St. Cassian's Kintbury. The retreat gave the students some time away from their busy college schedules, allowing them to focus on themes such as reconciliation and the Good News.



Reflections take place daily just prior to break time. During this Lenten season, reflections have centered on the traditional pillars of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. In keeping with our commitment to being an inclusive community, we are framing these practices as opportunities for both personal growth and collective social responsibility.

Students and staff are invited to participate in "purposeful fasting"—not only through traditional abstinence but by "fasting" from unsustainable habits or digital distractions to create space for mental wellbeing. All staff and students have also been invited to Mass and Stations of the Cross, which take place every Wednesday during this holy season. This period serves as a timely reminder of our core values: fostering a culture of self-discipline, empathy, and active service to our wider community.



This year's Confirmation course has drawn six enthusiastic students, keen to deepen their faith journey. The course is structured into six sessions, designed to explore key tenets of Christian belief and practice. The culmination of their journey will be the Confirmation Mass, which will be held on Wednesday, 6th May at 4:30 pm. We are delighted that Episcopal Bishop Gerard Bradley will once again celebrate the Mass, guiding the students as they receive the Sacrament of Confirmation

Fundraising and Charity work

We are blessed by the amount of fundraising undertaken by our students and staff. So far this year, students and staff have raised over £2715. The Chaplaincy charity committee have just launched the Big Lent Raffle. Students wrote to local retail outlets asking them for their support, and some responded positively with some gift vouchers, which will be raffled. My thanks to Sainsbury's, Greggs, Marks and Spencer's, Nando's and Costa Coffee for their support. Proceeds from the raffle will be used to buy some hygiene packs for local rough sleepers who often use the facilities of the Ascension Church, which is just across the road from the College. Some of the other charities supported this year include: Macmillan Cancer, British Red Cross, ACLT, Refuge, MIND, Mentivity, Great Ormond Street Hospital, Key Changes, and Ace of Clubs.

My thanks to everyone who has donated this term.

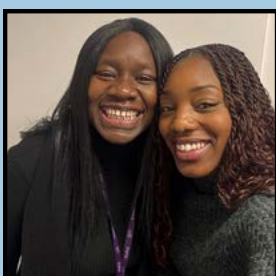
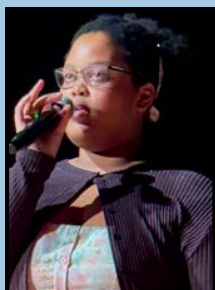

This Term in Pictures

T Level Media Broadcast and Production and UAL Creative Media Production and Technology students had an exciting morning last week, exploring the Media Studios at Young Creators UK. They learned first-hand about the studio's creative projects, production processes, and the wide range of roles that bring media content to life. Meanwhile, second-year UAL Creative Media, Production and Technology students spent the day exploring the Wes Anderson Archives at the Design Museum - diving into storyboards, props, costumes, set designs, and the meticulous world behind his iconic films.



Not to be outdone by their UAL and T level counterparts, year 12 A Level media studies students took part in a full day of interactive workshops at the British Film Institute exploring media industries and media audiences, with a special focus on Disney and the making and marketing of Black Panther - one of their key A Level Media case studies.

Meanwhile, Business students participated in the Hebe Foundation's Urban Debaters' communication project, a programme delivered in partnership with global law firm Eversheds Sutherland



Student Wellbeing Ambassadors joined Lambeth Landscapes to plant new trees and hedgerows on Clapham Common - a hands-on project that brought together environmental action, teamwork, and community engagement as well as supporting students' mental health.



A collaboration between A Level Italian and A Level Politics led to a visit to the European Parliament in the UK located at Europe House in Westminster, where they took part in a structured debate exploring the evolving relationship between the United Kingdom and the European Union.

UAL Performing and Production Arts students had an acting masterclass led by professional actor Adam Borzone from Central School of Speech and Drama.

This year, the team has designed an ingenious sustainable product that aims to reduce the time an individual spends in the shower, saving both water and energy. 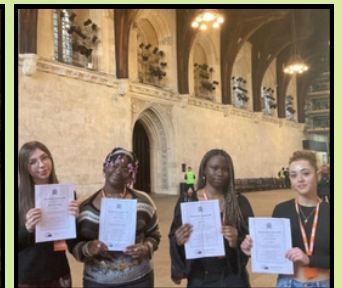


Thursday, March 5th, our Politics and Italian students took part in a high-impact experiential learning trip to the heart of British and European governance. By visiting both the UK Parliament and the European Parliament's UK Liaison Office, students gained a front-row seat to the mechanisms that drive national and international policy.

At the House of Commons, the group was privileged to meet with:

- Marsha de Cordova MP: Member for Battersea and Co-Chair of the UK-EU Parliamentary Partnership Assembly.
- Lena Maria Linnus: Head of the European Parliament's Liaison Office in the UK.

The sessions focused on the weight of parliamentary responsibility, the necessity of cross-border cooperation, and potential career pathways in public service. The afternoon concluded at Europa House in Smith Square, where interactive workshops brought the role of the European Parliament to life. This visit provided invaluable context for the Italian History unit and Politics curriculum, offering our students direct access to the role models shaping our political landscape.



Year 12 History students recently visited The National Archives, UK, in Kew as part of their Democracies in Change course. They worked with original, declassified government documents on the US Civil Rights Movement, examining memos, reports, and news clippings relating to key events such as the Little Rock Nine, the Greensboro Sit-ins, and the March on Washington. A highlight of the visit was the chance to view one of the rare surviving original copies of the US Declaration of Independence, offering students a powerful connection to the historical foundations of modern democracy.



The College Choir recently visited Nightingale Care Home to perform a number of songs, including Lovely Day, Let There Be Peace on Earth, Oh Happy Day, Revelation 19:1, and a Gospel Medley, which was especially requested by the residents. Each of our winners was nominated by staff or peers for the meaningful impact they've had over the past year.

Eight of our outstanding student award winners attended the Wandsworth Civic Centre to be presented with their awards, along with their families, and our two Leader Award winners: Wellbeing Officer, Amy Stanford and ESOL teacher, Elinor Thomas-Patel. It was a wonderful evening celebrating their achievements and the dedication they bring to SFX every day. All award winners receive £300 which can be spent on curriculum activities such as days out or group meals.



Public Exams Summer 2026

Public Exams for GCSE, A Level and BTEC/CTEC will commence in earnest at the beginning of May. However, there are some exams in Languages and Art that commence soon after we return from the Easter break. It is important that students prepare thoroughly for these exams; we are suggesting that, on average, students should be doing 2-3 hours of revision per day over the break. Students should check Dashboard for dates, times and locations of each examination. Morning exams commence promptly at 9am and afternoon exams at 1.30pm. Students are expected to arrive at least 30 minutes before the published start time for each examination. Students will not be able to enter the exam hall after the exam has started. I am therefore asking for parents'/ carers' help in ensuring that students arrive to their exams in plenty of time. Thank you.

Careers and Progression

The Careers Department at the College offers guidance to students to assist them in making informed career decision, ensuring they transition successfully into university, apprenticeships or employment. The UCAS deadline came and went in January, and we are encouraged both by students' aspirations and the offers they are receiving. In total, almost 90% of our Year 13 cohort submitted UCAS applications, one of our highest ever numbers. 78% of those applications were to Top Third universities, and 55% were to Russell Group universities. Offers have been flooding in. Notable offers include:

This event served as a powerful catalyst to focus minds on the range of progression options available, whether through traditional degrees or apprenticeships. With an impressive turnout of 58 representatives from universities, apprenticeship providers, and leading employers, the sports hall was filled with students all eager to map out their futures. It was a truly fantastic event. Massive thanks go to our new Careers Manager, Ms. Blyghton, for successfully organising her first major careers event at the college—it was a resounding success!

SFX alumna Melinda Samopolou (M&G trainee) was joined by James Emerson (JP Morgan trainee) and Mia Blake (BNP Paribas AM trainee) who shared their experiences of the trainee programme.

Students learned that the Trainee Programme gives them a full-time paid role for at least 12 months, along with loads of training, support and networking opportunities to help them grow. They were excited to hear that there are in excess of 50 investment firms signed up, giving them access to a huge range of placements - and most importantly, it all adds up to a genuine route into the investment industry.

SFX Essential 8



We continue to invest in delivering the SFX Essential 8, a programme designed to enhance students' personal development and equip them with the transferable skills, behaviours, and attitudes essential for success in the workplace. This comprehensive programme is integrated into both the tutorial sessions and the broader academic curriculum. This term, our focus has been on the vital skills of speaking and listening. Students who showed significant progress in cultivating these skills were recognised with an Essential 8 certificate. Additionally, the Hebe Foundation played a crucial role in facilitating 'The Big Debate', an event that encouraged students from across the college to engage actively and refine their speaking and listening abilities by debating various pressing topics. This initiative not only bolstered their communication skills but also fostered critical thinking and confidence.

I'm delighted that the College has been recognised by Skills Builder UK for the work we have done on embedding essential skills (such as teamwork, problem solving and communication) into the curriculum

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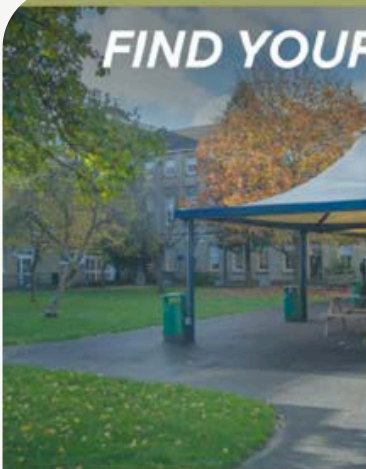


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
