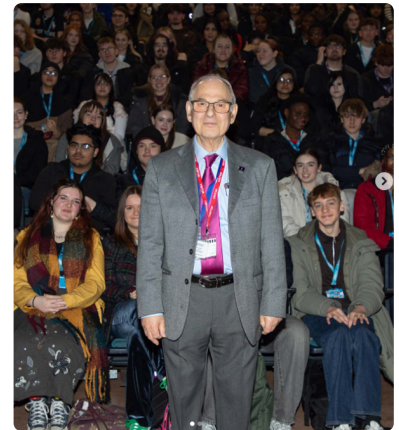

Every year the events of the Holocaust are reflected upon. On Thursday 22nd January we invited Ernie Hunter into college to share his family's story with Politics and History students.

Ernie Hunter shared the story of his mother, Fanny Höchstetter, born in September 1902 in Laupheim, Germany. His presentation focused on the gradual escalation of anti-Jewish actions and legislation from 1933 onwards and how the Nazis systematically destroyed long-standing friendships and community relations in this small Catholic-majority market town where Jews had been fully integrated into religious, cultural, and social life.
